

CALL FOR NOMINATIONS – DUE FEBRUARY 1, 2017

ARCS EMERGING SUSTAINABILITY SCHOLAR AWARD

The ARCS Emerging Sustainability Scholar Award recognizes a scholar in the area of corporate sustainability who is likely to make significant contributions to the advancement of corporate sustainability scholarship. The award will be granted in recognition of a scholar's existing body of research and in anticipation of future work, given the scholar's research trajectory. The selection committee will look for candidates with rigorous and salient contributions that cross disciplinary and national boundaries. The award winner must hold a doctorate degree and must not have been granted tenure. Nominations should be submitted online to https://www.scheller.gatech.edu/arcsnom.

Anyone is welcome to nominate suitable candidates. Self-nominations are also acceptable. Nominations for the award should be accompanied by a motivation letter explaining why and how the nominee meets the award criteria. In addition, nominations should include a recent curriculum vitae of the nominee. Nominations are due by February 1st, 2017. The awardee will be informed by March 1st. The award will have one recipient, who will receive a \$1000.00 cash prize.

The award winner will be recognized at the annual <u>ARCS Conference</u>, to be held June 14-16, 2017 at the Rotterdam School of Management, Erasmus University, the Netherlands. At the conference, the winner will be asked to do a 10 minute presentation (<u>TED-style</u>) to share their research agenda and to articulate a "big idea" for advancing scholarship in the domain of corporate sustainability.
